THE NICENE CREED

The people kneel or are seated. The Celebrant continues.

Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me"

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O God, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

LITURGY

For the season of Easter, we return to our alleluias and silver chalices after the spare simplicity of Lent. Our liturgical prayers at Communion for this season are from the 1979 Book of Common Prayer. The prayers of the people were composed by Laurel Roberts, Wes Rohrer, Anthony Crisafio, and Sara Irwin. Our Sunday 8am and Wednesday noon services will run through the Fifth Week of Easter (concluding by Memorial Day Weekend). Easter season is 7 weeks, ending on the Feast of Pentecost (June 8).

EDUCATION

Our Thursday morning zoom group, "Growth in the Spirit," will be reading Short Stories by Jesus: The Enigmatic Parables of a Controversial Rabbi by Amy-Jill Levine for Easter season, beginning on May 1 and concluding at the end of June. Contact Wes Rohrer at wmrun@pitt.edu if you would like to join.

Our Sunday 9am Study will be looking at the resurrection appearances of Jesus in a more traditional Bible study format, beginning on April 27 and wrapping up on June 1. Come for one or all study meetings; the full schedule will be included in the Weekly Update.

Church School continues until May 18 when we finish this program year with a family picnic on the lawn after church. Children ages 4 to 12 can join us for Vacation Bible School, June 2-4 from 5:30 to 7:00. Dinner will be provided each evening. This year's theme is Saints.

OUTREACH

For the Easter season, we are focusing on two of our outreach ministries: The Neighborhood Academy and Treasure House The Neighborhood Academy is a faith-based, college-preparatory academy established to provide excellence in education and character development for low income students from 6th to 12th grades. All of their students are accepted at and go to college. This year, twenty-five seniors are preparing for graduation, and an "angel tree" in Brooks Hall allows us to make donations of \$25, \$50, or \$150 toward the \$150 gift cards we give each senior. In July and August, we will prepare backpacks filled with school supplies for all of their students in partnership with other congregations. We also restock their in-school support pantry three times a year. Treasure House Fashions provides gently used clothing and accessories to women in crisis or transition. Treasure House is the "closet" for over 60 local agencies, whose clients receive coupons to shop for whatever kind of clothes they need in a boutique setting. Their resale location at 7507 McKnight Rd also funds their operations-all shoppers welcome! Groups from St. Andrew's have helped prepare the donated clothing for sale and have worked as personal shoppers for groups of customers from agencies. First Lesson Acts 9:36-43

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them, and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile, he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.
